- 1. Choose "Yes" when asked if you are eligible for a fee waiver.
- 2. Pick the indicator(s) that apply to you and provide your signature.
- 3. Select "Yes" to receive more information about connecting with Strive for College.
- 4. Create an account at https://www.ustrive.com/students/commonapp.

After creating your UStrive account, you'll be able to select the Strive mentor of your choosing. You can then choose whether you prefer to message, call or video chat to work through your questions. (You are able to do all of those directly through the UStrive platform.)
